

📲 Talbot Clan Genealog



of land and dumped up to 20 feet of sand on the few fields and pastures in the area. The vicinity of Tucker's Town was also prone to waterspouts and tornadoes which wrecked many homes and cut paths of destruction across the land. In the early 20th century Tucker's Town was one of the most desperately poor and neglected locales in Bermuda.

About 1800 Benjamin Dickinson Harvey had assembled 12 lots totalling nearly 200 acres in the Tucker's Town area, between Tucker's Town Bay and Trott's Pond to the west. Harvey, a lawyer who lived nearby in Hamilton Parish, seems not to have built on the property. In 1862 his heirs sold 11 of the lots (103 or more acres) to James Talbot, then aged about 42. Talbot, a black man and son of Baker Talbot, also of Tucker's Town, is variously described in the records as fisherman, labourer, farmer and planter. He and his wife brought up a large family in the area. It was James Talbot who in 1882 sold for a nominal amount the

land for a school to serve the area. This school survives as Lookout Cottage on South Road, just before the entrance to the Mid Ocean Club. The eight trustees had the aim of erecting a building "suitable for a schoolroom and for the holding of meetings for the encouragement of temperance".

In 1885 James Talbot was assessed in the church records for a new house and it is probable that this is the original wing of Earnscliffe. Two wings to the south were soon added, and a large new domed tank built when the original small tank was enclosed by the wings. Fronting on South Road, near the junction with Paynter's Road, Earnscliffe is still remembered as Talbot's Store, run by one of the sons of James Talbot in the early years of this century. It had the first telephone in the area. The Bermuda Development Company later used it for offices, and when the wooden verandah, which at that time ran along the road, collapsed they proposed to demolish the whole house. In the 1970s Dr. William (Peter) Outerbridge (now of Clifton Vale in St. George's) persuaded them to allow him to restore the building, and it was he who created the present handsome residence. He moved the access to the eastern side of the house, stopped up the downstairs old shop doors, built a chimney on that side and enclosed part of the eastern verandah.

Tucker's Town changed dramatically in the 1920s. In response to the rise of tourism, led by an influx of American visitors seeking an escape from the urban jungles of the east coast, a group of Bermudians formed the Bermuda Development Company to create an exclusive and prestigious enclave in this neglected backwater of Bermuda. In a move similar to the base lands takeover, the corporation was empowered to force those living in Tucker's Town to sell their land. James Talbot's son, Benjamin Darrell (B.D.) Talbot, still owning 74 acres of his father's 103, and reputed to have

#### JAMES TALBOT - Last Will and Testament

NOTE AND DISCLAIMER BY TRANSCRIBER: This is a rough transcription of the Will of James Talbot and may have some typing errors - I advise that the original Last Will & Testament be consulted.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN...

I, James Talbot, of Tuckers Town in the Parish of Saint George in the Islands of Bermuda, Planter, do hereby revoke all former wills and other testamentary dispositions heretofore made by me, and do declare this to be my last will and testament.

FIRST: I do will and direct that all my just debts, funeral and testamentary charges be paid out of my estate as speedily as possible after my decease.

SECOND: I give and bequeath all my personal estate and effects whatsoever and wheresoever to my wife Joanna Talbot, also, I give and devise nineteen [19] acres of that part of my real estate on which my present residence stands, with the outbuildings, gardens, and appurtenances thereunto belonging, situate in Tucker's Town in the Parish of Saint George, together with the lot know as Castle lot and measuring fifteen [15] acres situate in the aforesaid town and parish: bounded northerly by the waters of Castle Harbor; Easterly by the waters dividing Castle island from my said lot; Southerly by the sea; and westerly by a wall, the same with the residue of my estate to hold to my said wife Joanna Talbot her heirs and assigns forever.

To my nine children I give and devise my real estate in the following manner, namely:

I first direct that a road twelve feet wide be made, extending northerly from the public road to such part or parts of my land as will give to my children ingress and egress.

Secondly, that each shall hold his or her portion as his or her land marks respectively shows numbering from three to eleven, i.e.: to Benjamin Darrell five acres, marked three; to John Samuel seven acres, marked four; to Henry Thomas thirteen acres, marked five; to Harrington Artemus Lesly thirteen acres, marked six; to Princess Jennings six acres marked seven; to Lydia six acres, marked marked [sic] eight; to Serenia Cordelia six acres, marked nine; to Catherine Virginia six acres, marked ten; to Julia Ann six acres, marked eleven, to hold to them my said nine children their heirs and assigns for ever.

Should any of my said children die without issue or intestate, in every such case the inheritance so left shall go to my wife Joanna Talbot absolutely; should my said wife die intestate, her real estate so left shall be equally shared and divided between my surviving children, and the heirs of my deceased children.

Third and lastly: I do here nominate and appoint Charles William Thomas SMITH and Samuel Paynter RICHARDSON to be my executors to this my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand this twenty third day of February in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety three.



#### Jury's award of £8.200 TO D. B. TALROT

The Tuckerstown Land Case Excites Much Local Imterest.

On Friday 2nd. at Tuckers Town a Jury was drawn to assess the value of land owned by Messrs. B.D. and John Talbot. The Jury comprised, James Hill Hollis (Foreman) Howard Emmett Dunscombe Smith, Frederick Collins Outerbridge, William Robert Lightbourn, Arthur Roberts Wilkinson, George Harrison Outerbridge and Foreman Outerbridge. Outerbridge, William Robert Light-bourn, Arthur Roberts Wilkinson, Geore Harrison Outerbridge and Francis Anthony Hollis. Great interest has centered around

Great interest has centered around the expropriation proceedings in connection with the property of B.D. Talbot, one of the largest land owners in Tuckers Town, and on the day on which the Jury were drawn Mr. F. Goodwin Gosling made, on behalf of the Development Company. a final offer which was rejected by Talbot who preferred that the case should go before a Jury.

Mr. Gosling's offer was £10,000 in cash, 6 acres of land in more or less the same district as that in which B. D. Talbot had always lived, and £1,200 with which to build a house. This rejected offer represented an aggregate of some twelve or thirteen thousand some twelve or thirteen pounds.

pounds.

An early start in the case was made on Wednesday morning and the jury took from 10 a.m. to 1.30.p.m in which to view the property, comprising 74 acres with a stone house and shop, two stone cottages and a stone barn, all in good condition situated thereon. An interval for lunch and recuperation after the morning's strenuous inspection occurred and at 2.55 p.m. the hearing was resumed, Mr. H. V. Smith representing Mr. B. D. Talbot and Mr. J. R. Conyers the Bermuda Development Company.

Talbot having been duly sworn stated of

Talbot having been duly sworn stated that he estimated the annual rental of his house at £30, store at £30, two cottages at £36, and barn at £12 or £14. He said that his nett annual in come during the past five years from farming for export purposes was £500. He rents part of his planting land for £60 per annum. His grocery business he estimated to be worth £100 per annum, his summer crop of melons, corn. etc., at £100 per annum, and of wood and timber at £200 per annum, in addition to which he uses himself firewood valued at 3 - per diem. The sale of lenons gives him an annual income of from £8 to £12 and his seaweed catch is a large one. He was there cross examined by Mr. J. R Convers who stated that according to his (Talbot's) figures the property yielded an annual income of £1036. When asked if this was so, Talbot replied in the affirmative. Further cross examination revealed the fact that he was 62 years old and owed £300 on mortgage. He knew the Walker property comprising 54 acres but did not know if it had been sold ts the Company for £4.500. Mr. Conyers stated that Talbot has only a right of footway to it.

Some questions were asked by the

Some questions were asked by the Jurors concernining Talbot's estimated annual income of £500 for farming. In reply to queries as to how many men he employed he stated that ho employed three mea regularly and sometimes as many as twenty. Mr. C. W. W. Walker was then called as a witness on the Company's behalf and stated that his wife had owned 54 acres of !and with house and cottage near Tucker's Towr. This property had been sold to the Development Company for £4,500 which he considered a good price. Seventeen acres of the land was used for planting and the rest was made up of Trott's Pond, grazing and timber land. land.

B. D. Talbot when recalled stated that the Company's plans of his property were not quite correct. He owned 83 or 84 acres of land, 34 of which were arable and 22 under actual cultivation, he said.



## JURY GIVES £4,750 TO MR. OUTERBRIDGE

Commander Larg, R,N., Says Castle Harbour Is One Of Best On Atlantic Seaboard.

One of the most interesting cases of the entire expropriation proceedings consequent upon Messrs. Furness, Withy's entrance into the tourist trade of Bermuda was heard at Walker's House, Tucker's Town. on Tuesday.

The case in question was that of Wor. T. H. H. Outerbridge, M.C.P., owner of some forty acres of land with a water frontage on Castle Harbour. On the land are two stone cottages and a stone barn.

Proceedings ope ed at 11.30 a.m. and a Jury, comprising Messrs. Arthur Robert Wilkinson (foreman), William Southworth Cooper, John Bryan Astwood, Elmer Winfred Brown, Francis Anthony Hollis, George Taplin Miller and Robert Oliver Clifford. was empanelled.

After the Jury had been sworn and other preliminaries gone through with, the property in its entirety was viewed. It took until 1.30 p.m. to do this, after which an adjournment was made for lunch.

The hearing was resumed at 2.30 p.m., Mr. Outerbridge conducting his own case and Mr. J. R. Conyers, M.C.P., appearing on behalf of the Bermuda Development Co.

Mr. Outerbridge being duly sworn as a witness on his own behalf stated that, believing that Castle Harbour would one day be the principal part of Bermuda, he had acquired the property, now under consideration, as a business site. On December 13, 1919, Hon. S. S. Spurling, on behalf of the Development Co., was given a 90-day option to purchase at \$50,000. On March 11, 1920, after the expiration of 89 days, Mr. Spurling wrote him a letter declining to exercise his option on the ground that the price was excessive.

In enumerating the special of the property, Mr. Outerbrithat he owned the largest differentiage on Castle Harbour

on his land. When cross-examined by Mr. Convers as to the price at which he had purchased he said he did not know.

had purchased he said he did not know, Mr. Conyers: "Did you pay £500?"
Mr. Outerbridge: "Yes, I paid more than that."

He did not know how much arable land there was but valued the and, up it from the water front, at between \$25,000 and \$26,000. He did not know on what assessment he paid taxes. His income from the property was \$264 per annum.

Further questions elicited the information that his purchase price of the various lots, which were now being considered as a whole, was approximately £1940.

Mr. Outertridge then summoned as a kinness Engineer Commander Large R.N., who stated that, speaking as an expert, he considered Castle Harbour to be one of the best Harbours on the Atlantic seaboard and capable of such development as would enable it to take the world's largest ships, either Navel or of the merchant marine.

Cross-examined by Mr. Conyers as to whether he knew anything about dredging, he stated that he was not an authority.

In reply to a question by Wor. R. W. Appleby, Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, as to whether it would be a costly matter to develop the Harbour, Commander Larg stated that he did not think it would be very costly. There was now about 19 feet of water at the entrance, which would of course have to be deepened. There is not a large number of reefs on this particular side of the Harbour and such as are there are pinnacle reefs and easily removed.

Mr. W. B. Smith, late Engineer-in-Charge of Channel Works, was next called as a witness by Mr. Outerbridge. He submitted a plan, drawn to scale, of Castle Harbour with a plan of St. George's Harbour super-imposed. This plan showed the relative size and merit of the two harbours and Mr. Smith's eccompanying report went to show that Castle Harbour possessed many natural advantages over that of St. George's and that it would be a comparatively simple and inexpensive matter to develop the former.

Mr. F. Goodwin Gosling, Secretary of the Bermuda Development Co., was then called as a witness by Mr. J. R. Conyers. He stated that a Jury had awarded John Talbot £600 for a 7½ acre lot near that of Mr. Outerbridge. He knew the cave which had been referred to as an asset. It was unsafe and not capable of development. He assured the Jury that it was not the intention of the Development Co. to open up the Harbour.



sion remain and the newspapers provide only a spotty record. About 150 acres of land seem to have been at stake. Of this acreage, one large parcel of 74 acres was held by Benjamin Darrell "BD" Talbot and was clearly going to be the linchpin in the proceedings. Talbot was probably the most prominent Tucker's Towner, a landowner, farmer and keeper of the general store. A former butler to one of the last white farmers, Seth Harvey, Talbot was renowned for wearing his butler's coat and top hat as he ploughed his land. He wanted £25,000 while the company was offering him £6,500. On this contest, the whole campaign would probably hang.

The commission established itself in a house on the edge of Mangrove Lake. From there the jurors it empanelled could walk into Tucker's Town to inspect disputed plots of land. Through the fall of 1920, a spate of small claims was dealt with, some by arbitration and others by jury. Gosling always represented the company. Sometimes he offered straight cash, sometimes cash plus land and a home elsewhere. The outcomes varied. In some cases, Gosling fattened his offer and an out-ofcourt settlement was reached. In others, the jury improved the company's offer: in December, Benjamin Prieth, who had originally been offered £2,900 for four acres, was awarded £4,000. In general, the commission seemed to result in recalcitrant Tucker's Towners receiving somewhat more generous treatment from the company, provided the initial offer and counter-offer were within reasonable striking distance.

The gap between Gosling's and B D Talbot's positions was enormous. Early in 1921, the company moved towards Talbot's £25,000 by offering £10,000, plus six acres of land and a house elsewhere. Talbot refused and a jury was selected. The commission urged the jury to award Talbot £7,500. After deliberating, the jury gave Talbot £8,200. The verdict was front page news in the *Royal Gazette*. The company appeared to have broken the back of the opposition. A month later, the champion of the original petition, Dr Outerbridge, himself proffered the company 40 acres on the edge of Castle Harbour and was awarded £4,750 for it. By his own admission, the land had cost him £1,940.

With each decision, another morsel of old Tucker's Town was bitten off. Many Tucker's Towners resettled in Smith's Parish, where the farm land was generally better and where the company had constructed a series of bun-

galows — along Sommersall Road — which constituted a part of the swap agreements. By spring 1923, Gosling could tell the Governor that the land acquisitions were "now almost completed". He declared that only a "lunatic and three hold-out land owners" remained. In the end, only one resident of Tucker's Town was actually physically evicted. Dinna Smith lived in a small house near Tucker's Town Bay. From the day she signed the original petition,

she had never wanted to leave. Legend remembers her as short and pugnacious, so devoted to her home that if caught away from it she would risk torrents of rain and gale force winds to reach her own bed. Through the commission, she was awarded a new Sommersall Road home in Smith's. Still she refused to go. Finally, late in 1923, the police were called. Smith's possessions were removed and, when she once again refused to go, she was carried out. Her home was boarded up and old Tucker's Town ceased to exist.

Dinna Smith remained embittered to her death. She seldom left the porch of her new "home", whiling away the hours sitting on an orange crate smoking a pipe. Whenever anyone passed, she was sure to recite a ditty that captured her version of the controversial events:

Goodwin Gosling is a thief, And everyone knows it. He carries his whistle, And Stanley Spurling blows it.

Smith apparently took pleasure in harassing Gosling with this song whenever he was in the neighbourhood. An enraged Gosling invariably reacted by shouting: "Get that woman away from me!"

Even before Dinna was evicted, the new Tucker's Town was rapidly taking shape. Charlie Macdonald and a small army of landscapers worked through 1921 carving an 18-hole golf course out of what had once been farms and brush land. In July, Gosling treated the members of the Assembly to a picnic at the site. When the course was opened in early 1922, it met with rave reviews. The editor of the *American Golfer* called it "one of the most wonderful courses" he had even seen.

The golf course would become the centrepiece of what was to be called the Mid Ocean Club. As the fairways took shape, Charles Wetmore's clubhouse rose beside the sea. Tennis courts, beach houses and bridle trails followed. The company's second ambition was to sell up to 300 one-acre lots dotted through its new Tucker's Town domain. On these, "quality" residential tourists could build tasteful "bungalows" in which they could spend the winter months in Bermuda's warmth and seclusion. The first of these lots was sold with much fanfare to Theodore Roosevelt's nephew, George Roosevelt. Company publicity stressed that the new

Tucker's Town would conform to the decorum of Bermuda's white-roofed architecture. A Harvard architect, John S Humphreys, was embraced to ensure adherence to authentic Bermuda design. In 1923, Humphreys flattered the Mid Ocean Club's intentions by publishing Bermuda Houses, a book celebrating Bermuda's visual distinctiveness. The company also employed Olmsted Brothers — designers of New York's Central Park in the

# TUCKERS TOWN JURY GIVES MR. PRIETH £4000

On Tuesday morning another property in the area which is being acquired by the Bermuda Development Company was valued by a jury. This belonged to Mr. Benedict Prieth, owner of about 4 acres of land in Hamilton Parish. It has a water front on Harrington Sound, and contains a large house and a small cottage.

The jury awarded him £4000.

The Commissioners met under the chairmanship of Major R. W. Appleby. Mr. J. R. Conyers appeared for the Company, and Mr. G. C. G. Montagu, for Mr. Prieth. Mr. John Howard Cooper was foreman of the jury.

Mr. H. C. Masters, sr., valued the property as follows—house £2000, cottage £350, and land £850, a total of £3200. Evidence was given as to the improvements carried out by Prieth, and in addressing the jury Mr. Montagu argued that they should take into acthe depreciation of the Pound, Prieth being an American citizen, losing heavily if he were to transfer the money into U.S. currency.

Against this Mr. Convers said the jury should only consider what they would pay themselves.

The above verdict was given.

In the early stages of the proceedings, the last offer made to Mr. Prieth was £2900, while £4,500 was claimed.

During the week end the Commissioners will view certain properties, and hear three cases, while next week two jury cases will be taken.

# TUCKERS TOWN LAND CASES ARE HEARD.

On Tuesday morning the Tuckers Town Commissioners met at the Walker's house, in that parish and transacted a very considerable amount of business.

The first case to be considered was one which dealt with the estate of Princess Jennings Smith and involved all sorts of legal technicalities, as she died intestate leaving three daughters, Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Eddy and Mrs. Spencer. Mrs. Clark died some little time ago leaving three children, all minors, and pending the production of her will no settlement can be arrived at.

Mrs. Eddy on her own behalf and that of Mrs. Spencer claimed that they were the guardians of the three Clark children and asked £2,000 for the property, comprising approximately 11 acres of land with a stone cottage thereon. The case was adjourned whilst further inquirles are made.

The next case to be considered was that of Artemus Leslie Talbot, owner cf 15 acres, 54 perches of land with a wooden cottage situated thereon. The owner was represented by his brother B. D. Talbot who refused the Development Company's offer of £1100 and offered to sell for £2000. Mr. Gosling on behalf of the company went to £1600, which the Commissioners raised to £1650. Talbot refused and Mr. Gosling then raised his offer to £1800, which Talbot finally accepted.

The case of George Smith, owner of seven acres of iand with a stone cottage, is another very involved one, which could not be settled until further inquiries have been made. Smith had agreed to part with his property and to accept in exchange a piece of land with two cottages in Smiths Parish, plus £400 cash. It now transpires however that there is some doubt as to whether Smith owns the property, it being claimed that an inmate of the Asylum has an interest. Smith denies this and, pending further investigation, the case was adjourned.

> After the Commissioners had fortified themselves with lunch they adjourned to the house recently acquired by the Development Company from Benedict Prieth. Here a Jury assembled to assess the value of a property approximating one acre and belonging to George Stewart McLean of Shippensburg, Pa. The property is situated on Harrington Sound and adjoins that of Benedict Prieth. Mr. G.C.G. Montague appeared on behalf of Mc-Lean and Mr. J. R. Conyers on behalf of the Devolopment Company. The property was orginally purchased for £166 and the Jury awarded its owner £240.

Next was considered the case of Charles Hollis, employed by the Development Company as Foreman of their works at Tuckers Town. He is the owner of rather less than ¼ acre with stone cottage. Mr. Gosling, on behalf of the Company, offered to give him a lot measuring 100 X 100 and situated near Mangrove Lake. A four room cottage with kitchen and all modern conveniences will be built for him and in addition he will be given £100 in cash.

This offer was accepted by Hollis subject to his wife's approval of the proposed site.

The Commissioners then executed orders vesting the properties of A. E. Bourne, C. R.-W. Darrell, and T. I. O'Connor in the Company.

The next meeting of the Commissioners will be held at Tuckers Town to-day, when a Jury besides other business, will be drawn to consider the cases of B. D. and John Talbot, two of the largest land owners in Tuckers Town.
