 "Outlines the demands of the U.S. -- 24 seaplanes, rising to 72, 72 land planes, batteries for anti-aircraft guns, islands for storing explosives, 150 officers and 4,500 men, the land area from Waterlot Inn, Southampton to Somerset Bridge to be levelled and an air field to be constructed to 1.5 square miles.  
 Faced with a potentially disastrous butchery of the western end of the island, the Governor quickly moved to have Lt. Col. Swire, Senior British Officer and Engineer, negotiate a less catastrophic alternative. The Americans finally approved the East End site."
